One-Point Advice for Preparing for the Nankai Trough Earthquake

How to evacuate from buildings 建物から避難する方法



When an earthquake hits, what is the best method for evacuating a building? Here are a few depending on where you are: When you are unable to open a door, kick it. Turn the doorknob and secure it in the turned position using masking tape. Then, kick the door as hard as you can. If that still doesn't work, use a hammer or crowbar to break it down.

When escaping from the second floor, use rope or a rope ladder. If you don't have these, tie sheets or curtains together and use those. If you have to jump, throw a futon or mattress down first to break your fall, and aim for soft ground as opposed to concrete.

If your exit is blocked by fire, you will have to run as fast as you can. Tying a wet sheet around your body is a good way to protect yourself.

If you are in Shizuoka's underground walkway, stay close to the wall and stay away from smoke. Your nearest exit is 60m away or less; get there by following the wall as you walk. Remain calm and follow the instructions of staff.

If an earthquake hits or fire breaks out while you are at a hotel or department store, follow the instructions of the in-store broadcast and staff. If you do not know where the exit is, follow the guide lights along the wall.

If you are in a tall building, and fire has broken out on the floors above, descend the staircase. If fire has broken out on the floors below, use the outdoor fire escape. If you are unable to evacuate down the stairs, wait for help on the windward side of the roof. Make sure you do not use the elevator.

If you are locked in, and the doorknob is hot to the touch, there is a chance that the hallway outside is extremely hot. Rather than leaving the room, put a wet towel in the doorframe to prevent fire from getting in, open a window and tell those outside that you need help.
